Executive Summary	<p>The General Practice Forward View (GPFV) was published in April 2016 and committed an extra £2.4 billion a year to support general practice services by 2020/21. It contains specific, practical and funded steps on investment, workforce, workload, infrastructure and care redesign.</p> <p>The aim of this report is to update the meeting about new and current work programmes, support and guidance available and evaluation and reporting requirements relating to the GPFV</p> <p>The attached up-date report is produced on a monthly basis and shared with CCGs; the report provides an up-date on the national position of the differing programmes. Below are key issues that have developed since the production of the March report: -</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Intensive Support Retention Programme (Weston/Worle) Fortnightly calls continue to be held with the National Team to review progress against the action plan and to ensure that the funding allocated to the programme will be fully utilised. The national team commissioned a series of videos to be made about GPRISS. The first video – shot at the London launch event in November has been published. The link to the video is below. https://www.england.nhs.uk/gp/gpfv/workforce/retaining-the-current-medical-workforce/local-gp-retention-fund/ <p>The National Team have also agreed that the Weston/Worle Scheme will be one of three nationally promoted case studies – further details are to follow.</p>
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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Clinical Pharmacist in General Practice – the closing date for wave 8 applications was the 22nd February. 5 new applications have been received (3 – BNSSG, 1 - Wiltshire and 1 - BaNES) and 2 extension applications (1 – Wiltshire and 1 – BaNES). The applications have been considered by the Local Panel and were considered by the Regional Panel on the 20th March. <p>We are still waiting for further guidance to be published from the National Team on the implications of the “Five-year framework – GP Contract” on the programme.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • International GP Recruitment (IGPR) – The third interview panel was held in Plymouth over the 28/2 – 1/3. 4 GPs were interviewed and all were accepted onto the scheme, one of which will be based in Weston, discussions are on-going with BNSSG as to which practice is best suited to provide the educational support. <p>Planning for the event in Swindon between the 19 – 21 June is on-going, the venue has been booked and prospectus documents have been shared with the recruitment agency to promote the area.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Primary Care Networks – The SWN PCN event took place on the 27th March, Prof Nick Harding attended and gave a detailed briefing from the National Team which included implications of the “Five-year framework – GP Contract”. The event will support STPs to develop strategies for wider conversations with stakeholders. <p>Representatives attended the event on the 27th February arranged by the National Team this provided an opportunity for the National Team to provide clarity on the operational aspects of the framework.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Group Consultation – events to support practices who wish to implement Group Consultations are to be held on:- <p style="text-align: center;">25th April Cheltenham Racecourse, Glos 16th May – Double Tree Hilton, Bristol 23rd May – Swindon</p> <p>Venues and speakers have been identified and a formal invite is being drafted.</p>
